

Worth Taking a Look At ...

COUNCIL CORNER

Council met on Wednesday, March 18. Highlights of this meeting and the issues discussed are reported in this space. More detailed information and/or documents are available from the church office.

Updating the governance (i.e. Council) structure was continued from the previous meeting. Further work has been done in refining the new model in relation to the Harcourt Handbook format, the United Church Manual and suggestions that have been offered. A motion was passed to take the suggested model to a special Congregational meeting, probably in April, for confirmation. The Nominating Committee, namely the present Coordinating Committee, will be soliciting names for the elected positions of the new model after the model is ratified by the Congregation. The nominations are due by May 31, 2009.

The possibility of submitting an application by May 15, 2009 to partner with Inter Church Health Ministries to initiate steps to hire a Parish Nurse was discussed. A motion was passed to seek approval from the Congregation, at which time a detailed account of costs for the first five years would be available.

Council approved an expanded position of Children, Youth and Family Designated Lay Minister to replace the previous position of Children and Youth Ministry Staff Associate, effective July 1, 2009. The United Church has recently mandated a change in the title of the position. In addition, the responsibilities for the position here at Harcourt have been expanded to address the expectations of our JNAC (Joint Needs Assessment Committee) report. Council approved that the 30-hour per week contract position for July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010 be advertised. The Personnel and Christian Development Committees, with power to add, were delegated to carry on the search process. Cindy Verrall is welcome to apply for the new position.

The Personnel Committee handed out 2009 updated job descriptions of the office staff positions and asked Council to give feedback before being put to a motion at the next Council meeting.

A motion was passed to approve an event, open to the community, for a presentation of the new Local Growth Plan for Guelph. Special emphasis is to be given to development, policy and politics within the South of Guelph. The suggested date is April 16, 2009 and this meeting is expected to be held in the Sanctuary.

Information was presented concerning the possible development of a new kind of ministry in South Guelph by John Lawson, who is retiring from his ministry at Dublin United Church. A motion was passed that, if Waterloo Presbytery desires to discuss a role

for Harcourt in supporting a Presbytery-appointed Minister, whose mandate is to explore a ministry in South Guelph, Harcourt Council would be willing to enter into such discussions.

The Search Committee for a new Minister has reviewed 17 applications and is proceeding with interviews.

Two Leadership Training Opportunities will be presented by Anthony Robinson at Harcourt in April and people from Harcourt are urged to attend. There will be a presentation on April 21st and a workshop on April 25th. Anthony Robinson is from Washington State and is currently a Professor at Emmanuel College in Toronto. It is expected he will speak about the church and society in the past, how they are changing and what lay leaders need to know to help congregations address this shift creatively.

JOINT SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE

The Joint Search Committee has been working hard. By February 17, the application deadline for the full-time ordained minister the committee had received 17 applications. The committee has reviewed the applications and is conducting interviews in the latter part of March. I would like to thank those who provided input for the committee, it is greatly appreciated.

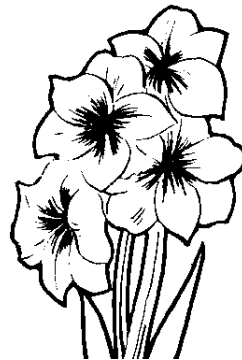

HARCOURT'S FINANCIAL POST

*The stuff that no one wants to read, but
everyone should read.*

A math question: What's the difference
between \$481,703 and \$532,578?

The answer: \$50,875.

What's the significance of this amount?

It's how much more in donations we need to
receive during 2009 if we are to meet our
financial obligations to our programs.

To date, in 2009, Harcourt Church is fully
staffed, but the financial statements show an
operating deficit of almost \$9,000 for
January and February. If this shortfall con-
tinues at this rate for the rest of the year, we
will end 2009 with a deficit of \$54,000.

A strategy question: Should we continue to
draw from our surplus to cover this shortfall?

At the present level of donations from the
Congregation, that will be our only option.

The Congregation has already approved the
budget and programs for 2009 and we need
each and every member's support.

Please help to maintain our church's financial
stability and viability and consider increasing
your givings, the backbone of our financial
support, by 10 to 15 percent. If you can man-
age 15 percent, you'll help the individual who
can manage five. (Don't forget, some of our
members are on a retirement income.)

In the near future, you will be able to view our financial situation on two charts in the Narthex. While you look to see where you are in our donations chart, consider "Stepping Up" to the next level and ensuring that the ministry of Harcourt will continue. We have exciting changes coming our way. Let's not miss out on the adventures and opportunities ahead.

More background: In 2008, we pulled ourselves out of an ever-deepening hole. Members of the Congregation dug into their resources and donated shares; a fund-raising auction (not an annual event) raised close to \$15,000; and 250 members increased their weekly givings by 151 percent. In addition, staff expenses were about \$7,000 less than usual, as we were not fully staffed.

CONTEMPLATIVE PHOTOGRAPHY AS A SPIRITUAL PRACTICE by Marilyn Whiteley

When do you get out your camera? Do you record family gatherings, holiday travels, and other special events? Maybe grab it when you see there's going to be a beautiful sunset? We enjoy taking and sharing these pictures, but photography can be more than this! Photography can form part of our spiritual journey. And for this we don't need a fancy

camera or expert knowledge. We only have to be open to going about taking pictures in a slightly different way.

Have you ever considered how often the language of photography is aggressive? We shoot a picture and we hate when we miss that shot. We capture the sunset or the baby's smile. Those practising Contemplative Photography start by adopting a different attitude. Instead of taking a picture, we try to receive a photograph! And as we open ourselves to God's presence in the world around us, we look in a newer, fresher, more direct way. We observe the world, as one writer expresses it, with "attention and love."

There are no rules for how to do this, but there are some guideposts. The emphasis is not on the "product" but on the "process." Our goal is not to bring home splendid photos to show to family and friends-though sometimes our photos may draw us and others by their power. The goal is to focus our seeing, not just our cameras, to look intently at what is waiting for us in God's creation. We can learn to see in a way that nurtures our souls.

Contemplative Photography asks us to put aside our preconceptions about good photographic subjects and "rules" of photography. It calls us to be present, to be in the moment, and to see what is there. Then, for me, a more intuitive than conscious process goes on as I try to frame and expose the picture so that it holds within it what I see at the moment. And perhaps it will even communicate some of that to others.

What happens when I do this? It's hard to explain, but I feel unusually centred and peaceful both during my photography and afterwards. And when I look at what I have "received," I often see more in the images than I did at the time, sometimes even an insight or a message.

We can learn to increase our "seeing" even in unlikely circumstances. When Hugh and I were on an Elderhostel in Jordan last December, our bus stopped beside the Dead Sea. Out we all clambered, as fast as our elderly legs would take us. Over we went to the north edge of the parking area. There, in beautiful sunshine, we saw an orange-coloured cliff, with a line of white crusted salt marking where the rocks met the aqua water. Click! Click! Click! Everyone took just about the same photograph of that classic view.

Then I wandered alone to the other end of the parking area, and looked against the sun at the shoreline to the south. There, sparkling in the sun, was the glory of the Dead Sea, just waiting for me to open my eyes and to use my camera to receive the image!

I have read about Contemplative Photography and twice I have registered for a weekend workshop/retreat on it-but twice it has been cancelled for lack of participants. I want to learn more, and I have just learned of another workshop. If this one isn't cancelled, perhaps in the fall we might schedule a brief event at Harcourt where I could share what I am learning and we could explore the rich opportunities afforded by Contemplative

Photography. In the meantime, take out your camera and look around with "attention and love"!

UPDATE ON UGANDA

Our four weeks in Uganda were busy this year, especially the first two when we were meeting with students, reviewing their progress and checking to see that their placements were appropriate. Our numbers are decreasing every year and we are now down to 28 students, six of whom are in secondary school, five who completed their secondary school courses in 2008 and will be looking forward to further education starting in August or September, 16 who are taking college level courses and one who is finishing up his BA degree at the Islamic University in Mbale this year.

We were very pleased to be able to congratulate students who completed their courses in 2008, especially the student who, three years ago, received a scholarship to attend university in Kampala and on February 27 received an honours graduation degree, one of only two in his class to pass with honours. He received his BA in Adult and Community Education and expects to work at the university for a year before finding employment in the community.

Other graduates in 2008 included two who received certificates, one in Lab Technology and another in Catering and Hotel

Management, and two who received Diplomas, one in Catering and Hotel Management and one in Forestry.

2009 graduates will include those taking Certificate courses in Child Care, Nursing, Electrical Installation, Auto Repair, Hair Dressing/Beautician and Primary Teaching, and at the Diploma level in Business and Plumbing. Those completing Certificate level courses may wish to go on to Diploma level courses, in which case we will suggest that they try to find employment for a year to gain some experience in their field then we hopefully will be able to help them upgrade to Diploma level.

2010 potential graduates will include students receiving Diplomas in Business, Law, Information Technology, English (Secondary Teaching), Public Administration, Nursing, and 2 in Catering and Hotel Management. We no longer will offer university level courses even with a scholarship because of the cost. However students with Diplomas should be able to find employment in their field and upgrade to a degree on their own.

We have now been assisting students for 8 years and the increase in the cost during those years is startling. When we first started helping students in secondary school in 2001, \$100.00 (C) would pay student expenses for a year. When we started providing hostel accommodation so students would not have to survive on one meal a day and do chores mornings before walking up to seven kilometers to school and in the evenings after walking home from school, \$225.00 would

pay for school fees and supplies as well as hostel fees and supplies.

In 2008, the average expenditure for the 15 secondary school students we sponsored was slightly over \$1000.00. School and hostel fees have more than doubled in the eight years, hostel supplies have also increased, i.e. mattresses, sheets, towels, etc. Educational supplies have increased because textbooks are now available for students, schools provide seminars, coaching and tours - yes, the schools own buses and take students on tours all at a cost to the student. Students even have to pay to write government exams at the end of Sr. 4 and Sr. 6 - the amount has now risen to as much as fees for one term of school. One school (a new one) even required students who wrote their Sr. 6 exams to provide 2 books for the library before they would give them their results. It also did not help that the Canadian dollar received a lower rate in Ugandan shillings for part of 2008.

For college level students, costs varied considerably - teachers' college is free, but students must supply all the materials they need for practice teaching. Trade School and Business School students had expenses averaging close to \$1500.00 while some of the students taking Arts related courses needed closer to \$2000.00.

Medication is also a big expense. Almost all students get malaria at least once during the year and as they get older the attacks are more severe. They all use mosquito nets, but once you have had malaria it can return at

any time without having been bitten by a disease carrying mosquito. Actually in Mbale where most students go to school we rarely see mosquitos but of course we are there during the dry season and mosquitoes are more prevalent during the rainy season.

We are very grateful to Harcourt United Church for collecting donations for the Uganda project and to the church members and other community members who generously support this project. We hope to be able to assist our current students to complete their education and would be so grateful if we could find a more youthful couple who would like to take over this project and possibly expand it to take on other students. The need is great - the population of Uganda, a country you could fit into Southern Ontario, is nearing the population of Canada. The big difference is that more than half of their population is under 16 years of age!! The Norben Student Sponsorship Committee in Mbale would love to supply us with the names of many deserving students who sincerely want an education and need help to get one.

We recommend it as a good retirement project!!!

Here's What's Happening in our Programs with Youth in April!

April is full of events and experiences that will challenge our youth to be the change they wish to see in the world and their church. It is also the month when we contemplate the mystery of Easter and how it influences our faith journeys.

During Holy Week our youth will partake in a Sedar Meal together. This is the meal Jesus shared with the disciples on the night he was arrested. In the Jewish faith, the Sedar is the ritual meal served on the first night of Passover, commemorating the flight of the Jews from Egypt. The ritual includes blessings, the pouring of "wine" and questions about the meaning of the event. In our tradition, it is also a time to ponder questions about the meaning of the Easter story together. Traditional foods are also shared and enjoyed.

WhYBe, our youth band will be offering music at the beginning of Worship on Palm Sunday. WhYBe: Digital Arts are preparing a video with our new camera to share in an upcoming worship service too! Don't be surprised to be "interviewed" by our film crew during coffee time over the next few weeks as we hope to include congregational footage in our inaugural project! On Maundy Thursday, our youth will be sharing leader-

ship of a special service with our Worship Team. On Good Friday we are travelling to Hamilton to gather with several hundred other United Church youth from all over South Western Ontario to celebrate Easter at a service hosted by Youth Eventz. This high energy service features a live worship band, drama, multi-media, and messages from youth for youth.

This month we are also holding our Famine weekend. This is a chance for our youth to gather together for an overnight retreat and fast to raise funds for Canadian charitable organizations that work for social justice in our world. This year we will be fasting to support One World Global Education Programs. One World facilitates life-long learning opportunities where youth participants immerse themselves in the everyday life of a community in the global south for eight months in order to gain a better, experiential, participatory understanding of poverty and injustice.

"While abroad, groups will have the opportunity to live with host families, learn local language, and volunteer with local organizations and on-going projects such as schools, medical clinics, food programs, women's groups, and orphanages. Although participants will be involved in various development projects, the primary objective is not to teach or to fix, but rather to learn from their hosts and work in solidarity with them". (www.oneworlded.com).

Pamela Girardi, one of our youth group leaders, works with One World Education and

has a group of students returning from eight months in Ghana this month. This year's Ghana group will be joining us for part of our retreat to share their experiences in Ghana with our youth as part of their debriefing program.

CAROLINE HARCOURT WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Rev Elizabeth Eberhart-Moffat talked to a capacity crowd of women in the Friendship Room at the March meeting of the Caroline Harcourt Women's Fellowship. Using descriptions in word and photos of her autumn 2008 pilgrimage in Spain with six other women, she emphasized the pilgrimages of life, and how each of us can use our early childhood memories to relive our individual step by step through all our experiences. Lent is a pilgrimage and such reflections are an important part of celebrating Lent. The 740 km pilgrimage took a month and build strong bonds among the women, whose motive was partly to commemorate seven friends who had died of cancer.
